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Top Health Care Careers in Kansas

This book highlights top health care professional job opportunities, at various educational levels, from less than one year of training to the requirement of a graduate degree. Health care professionals play a vital role in ensuring the health and well-being of Kansans. "Health care professionals" is a broad term that encompasses the many individuals who deliver health care in today's complex, patient care environment.

Kansas hospitals are busy places. The 122 community hospitals in Kansas provided care for more than:

- 306,000 inpatient visits
- 33,000 births
- 8.3 million outpatient visits
- 1 million emergency department visits

Health care, at its core, is about people caring for people. Kansas hospitals alone employ nearly 100,000 health care professionals. This does not include physician offices, clinics and the many other places health care professionals work. More than 240,000 Kansans, or nearly 12 percent of the state's total workforce, work in health care. This is more than the national average of 10 percent of all U.S. workers employed in health care.

Throughout Kansas and the nation, hospitals and other health care providers are experiencing workforce shortages. These shortages cause considerable strain on the health care system, especially since an aging population is expected to need more health care services in the immediate future, and many of today's health care professionals are nearing retirement age. Consider the following reasons for an increased need for health care professionals:

- The population of Kansas is expected to grow 28.8 percent by 2070.
- The population of Kansans over the age of 65 is projected to double over the next 50 years.
- Health care demands increase in later years in life.
- The average age of most practicing health care professionals is over 40 years, with an expectation of retirement in the next 10 years.

The success of the health care system is dependent on the availability of properly educated and trained professionals. People enter into careers in health care because they want to make a difference in the lives of others. The work a health care professional does is demanding and exacting. It requires skill, focus and attention to detail. Health care careers are some of the most respected, exciting, rewarding and fulfilling careers one can have.

Certified Nurses' Aides provide or assist with basic care or support under the direction of onsite licensed nursing staff. They perform duties such as monitoring of health status, feeding, bathing, dressing, grooming, toileting or ambulation of patients in a health or nursing facility.

EMT's assess injuries and illnesses and administer basic emergency medical care which may include transportation of injured or sick persons to medical facilities.

Medical Assistants, under the supervision of Physicians, perform a wide range of clinical and administrative functions, including taking patient histories and vital signs, collecting specimens, preparing, and administering medications, performing diagnostic tests, and otherwise assisting the Physician as directed. Medical Assistants also prepare and maintain medical records, write correspondence, perform medical transcription, and conduct other administrative medical office procedures.

DENTAL ASSISTANT

Dental Assistants perform limited clinical duties under the direction of a dentist. Clinical duties may include equipment preparation and sterilization, preparing patients for treatment, assisting the dentist during treatment, and providing patients with instructions for oral health care procedures. Dental Assistants may perform administrative duties such as scheduling appointments, maintaining medical records, billing and coding information for insurance purposes.

LICENSED PRACTICAL NURSE (LPN)

LPNs care for the sick, injured, convalescent and disabled under the direction of Physicians and Registered Nurses. Most LPNs provide essential bedside care. They observe patients and report adverse reactions to medications or treatments. They may administer prescribed medications or start intravenous fluids. Some LPNs help deliver, care for and feed infants. In some institutions, LPNs supervise nursing assistants and aides. LPNs must pass a national licensing examination to obtain a nursing license to practice in Kansas.

Pharmacy Technicians work under the direct supervision of a Pharmacist. They receive written prescriptions or requests for prescription refills, verify accuracy and completeness of the prescription information, perform some medication dosage calculations, pour liquid dosages or calculate the number of tablets required for a prescribed dose and prepare prescription labels. Pharmacy Technicians also may transport medications, order and maintain medication inventories, perform clerical duties, obtain prescriptions from physician offices, complete claim and billing forms for insurance companies, and perform other tasks in a pharmacy as directed by the Pharmacist.

Surgical Technologists are health professionals who are an integral part of the team of medical practitioners providing surgical care to patients. In order that surgery may proceed smoothly, Surgical Technologists anticipate the needs of Surgeons, passing instruments and providing sterile items in an efficient manner. Surgical Technologists also have primary responsibilities for maintaining the sterile field, being vigilant that all members of the team adhere to aseptic techniques and are responsible for the proper setup of the required surgical instruments.


DENTAL HYGIENIST

Although the overall range of dental services provided by a Dental Hygienist may vary depending on the location and the type of practice setting, most provide dental care to patients. This may include oral screening for diseases, taking and developing dental radiographs, removing calculus and plaque, applying preventive materials such as fluorides and sealants to teeth, making dental impressions and teaching good oral hygiene techniques. They also administer anesthetics, place, and carve fillings, provide periodontal dressings, remove sutures, and smooth and polish dental restorations. Dental Hygienists must be licensed to practice in Kansas.

Medical Records Technicians compile, process and maintain medical records of hospital and clinic patients in a manner consistent with medical, administrative, ethical, legal and regulatory requirements of the health care system. They classify medical and health care concepts, including diagnosis, procedures, medical services and equipment into the health care industry's numerical coding system. Includes medical coders.

Health Information Technicians apply knowledge of health care and information systems to assist in the design, development and continued modification and analysis of computerized health care systems. They abstract, collect and analyze treatment and follow-up information of patients. Duties may include educate staff and assist in problem solving to promote the implementation of the health care information system, design, develop, test and implement databases with complete history, diagnosis, treatment and health status to help monitor diseases.

PTAs assist physical therapists in providing physical therapy treatments and procedures. Duties may include, in accordance with state laws, assisting in the development of treatment plans, carry out routine functions, document the progress of treatment, and modify specific treatments in accordance with patient status and within the scope of treatment plans established by a physical therapist.

Respiratory Therapist assess, treat and care for patients with breathing disorders. They assume primary responsibility for all respiratory care modalities, including the supervision of respiratory therapy technicians. Duties may include initiating and conducting therapeutic procedures; maintaining patient records; and selecting, assembling, checking and operating equipment.

RNs work to promote health, prevent disease and help patients cope with illness. They are advocates and health educators for patients, families and communities. When providing direct patient care, they observe, assess and record symptoms, reactions and progress, and make nursing interventions based on nursing judgements obtained from findings; perform technical skills in delivery of nursing care; assist physicians and other health care team members; administer medications; and participate in care for restoration and rehabilitation. RNs develop and manage nursing care plans; instruct patients and their families in actions promoting healthy lifestyle choices and proper care; and help individuals and groups take steps to improve and maintain their health. While state laws govern the practice of RNs, it is usually the work setting that determines their day-to-day job duties.

In all states, students must graduate from a nursing program and pass a national licensing examination to obtain a nursing license. Nurses may be licensed in more than one state, either by examination or endorsement of a license issued by another state.

Nuclear Medicine Technologists prepare, administer and measure radioactive isotopes in therapeutic, diagnostic and tracer studies using a variety of radioisotope equipment. They prepare stock solutions of radioactive materials and calculate doses to be administered by radiologists. Nuclear Medicine Technologists subject patients to radiation; and execute blood volume, red cell survival and fat absorption studies following standard laboratory techniques.

RTs provide radiation therapy to patients as prescribed by a radiation oncologist according to established practices and standards. Duties may include reviewing prescription and diagnosis; acting as liaison with physician and supportive care personnel; preparing equipment, such as immobilization, treatment and protection devices; and maintaining records, reports and files. RTs may assist in dosimetry procedures and tumor localization.

ARNPs diagnose and treat acute, episodic or chronic illness, independently or as part of a health care team. They may focus on health promotion and disease prevention, order, perform or interpret diagnostic tests such as lab work and x rays and prescribe medication. ARNPs must be registered nurses who have specialized graduate education.

Physician Assistants provide health care services typically performed by a physician, under the supervision of a physician. They conduct complete physicals, provide treatment, counsel patients and prescribe medication. PAs must graduate from an accredited educational program for physician assistants.

LCSWs Social workers help people solve and cope with problems in their everyday lives. One group of social workers—clinical social workers - also diagnose and treat mental, behavioral and emotional issues.

Social workers typically do the following:

- Identify people and communities in need of help
- Assess clients' needs, situations, strengths and support networks to determine their goals
- Help clients adjust to changes and challenges in their lives, such as illness, divorce or unemployment
- Research, refer and advocate for community resources, such as food stamps, childcare and health care to assist and improve a client's well-being
- Respond to crisis situations such as child abuse and mental health emergencies
- Follow up with clients to ensure that their situations have improved
- Evaluate services provided to ensure that they are
 effective



- Develop and evaluate programs and services to ensure that basic client needs are met
- Provide psychotherapy services

Social workers help people cope with challenges in their lives. They help with a wide range of situations, such as adopting a child or being diagnosed with a terminal illness. Social workers may work with children, people with disabilities, and people with serious illnesses and addictions. Their work varies based on the type of client they are working with.

Some social workers work with groups, community organizations, and policymakers to develop or improve programs, services, policies and social conditions. This focus of work is referred to as macro social work.

Advocacy is an important aspect of social work. Social workers advocate or raise awareness with and on behalf of their clients and the social work profession on local, state and national levels.

Pharmacists dispense drugs prescribed by physicians and other health practitioners and provide information to patients about medications and their use. They may advise physicians and other health practitioners on the selection, dosage, interactions and side effects of medications.

Physicians make life and death decisions. They provide the highest standard of care and are legally and ethically responsible for the care and well-being of their patients. They are also ultimately responsible for the care given by other health care professionals to their patients.

Physicians diagnose specific illnesses, prescribe treatments and medications, and make decisions based on clinical assessments and laboratory testing. There are two types of physicians: The MD—Doctor of Medicine—and the DO—



Doctor of Osteopathic Medicine. While both MDs and DOs may use all accepted methods of treatment, including drugs and surgery, DOs place special emphasis on the body's musculoskeletal system, preventive medicine and holistic care.

About a third of MDs—and more than half of DOs—are primary care physicians. They practice general and family medicine, general internal medicine or general pediatrics. They are usually the first health professionals' patients consult. When appropriate, primary care physicians refer patients to specialists, who are experts in medical fields such as gynecology, cardiology or surgery.

Physicians may be employed by hospitals, but many have their own practice, which they share with other physicians or partners. Many are employed in the military, research labs, medical schools or rural or urban clinics.

Surgeons, like primary care and other specialist physicians, also examine patients, perform and interpret diagnostic tests, and counsel patients on preventive health care.
